

Sheltering our Unsheltered - Nighttime and Daytime Emergency Shelter Budget

Goal:

End unsheltered homelessness: Swarm and Solve! Rapidly flex up, shelter our unsheltered, reduce inflow - locally and regionally, assist with an individual's unique needs, accelerate outflow, rapidly flex down. Nighttime and daytime shelters are designed to supplement the existing permanent shelter and transitional housing options currently available in Portland.

Unsheltered Homelessness - Vehicles (RV, car, truck, van, camper, boat) <small>1st phase or population will be those in immediate harm who are sleeping exposed (e.g., tents, makeshift shelters, green spaces, doorways, etc.). 2nd phase or population will be those sleeping unsheltered in vehicles (RV, car, truck, van, camper, boat) that are inoperable, unlicensed, or uninsured. Additional time will allow vehicle owners to meet DMV requirements and 1st population to outflow from nighttime shelters into more permanent shelters and housing, creating additional capacity for 2nd population. Total Beds Needed to End Unsheltered Homelessness and Enforce No Camping Codes 2,306

Oregon HB 3115, which legalizes camping if there are not enough shelter beds available, will no longer apply. Portland's nighttime emergency shelter system will have the capacity to handle those who need it. Anyone who wants emergency shelter can now get it. No one is forced to sleep in the streets. Portland's community standards and dignity are re-established. Our city's shop owners and housed residents can expect that their doorways or sidewalks are free from their use as a bedroom or toilet as an unhoused person is to have a place to toilet as well as sleep safely and protected from the elements.

Shelter Portland Research:**

Spotlight: Reunification - Human Services Campus (HSC) 'Welcome Center,' Phoenix - "Would you like us to contact a family member or friend and let them know you would like to come home?" - Reunification/diversion provides a significant level of outflow for Phoenix' homeless services system - 5,700 guests were processed through their coordinated entry system and 10% asked for reunification assistance (bus ride home), 10%

Spotlight: Martin v. City of Boise - Former Mayor Bieter observed that, "when you normalize camping in your community, it draws people not only from the sheltered homeless and the housed locally, but regionally as well." When he ended unsheltered homelessness in Boise, he experienced the following outflow:
 One third of unsheltered homeless "accepted our offer of shelter" 33%
 One third of unsheltered homeless "went home locally" 33%
 One-third of unsheltered homeless "went back home REGIONALLY" 33%

"Homeless Upon Arrival": More than one-third of the entire INFLOW to Portland and Multnomah County are people that are 'homeless upon arrival' (see Shelter Portland, Timeline, 2016, Joint Office of Homeless Services, "35% of Homeless Person Are 'Homeless Upon Arrival' section). 35%

Former Boise Mayor Bieter's experience matches the number of "Homeless Upon Arrival" in Multnomah County

Boise's network of nighttime emergency shelters resulted in a 33% initial shelter bed utilization. However, Portland's prolonged and higher amount of unsheltered homelessness will most likely result in higher shelter bed utilization and a slower flex down. The slower "Nighttime Shelter Flex Down Percents" in the worksheet above reflect this more conservative approach.

Day Shelters Proforma Costing Analysis:

The Five S's: Safety, Security, Shelter, Sleep, and Services: Nighttime emergency shelters provide the first four ensuring guests are rested and ready for the next day. Day Shelters provide a "warm handoff" from the nighttime emergency shelters to connect guests with services.
